## Introduction

*Women of the Founding Era* is the first born-digital edition of the leading women of the Founding Era, 1750-1820.

3,000 documents (letters, diaries, and writings) will be transcribed using crowdsourced labor.

## Platform

The project archive will be built in Omeka which is a free, flexible, and open source web-publishing platform.

Omeka is widely adopted and has a growing user community, including:

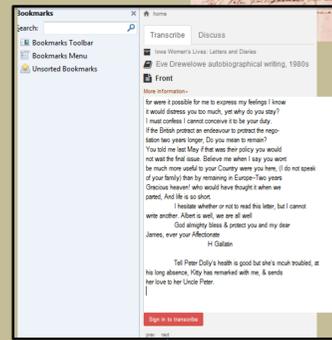
This project will bring together the dispersed writings of each person in the cohort to form a single "virtual" collection highlighting connections between them.

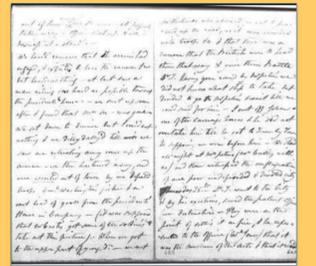
## Project Outcomes:
